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SUMMER READING CHALLENGE

All you need to do to take part in the Summer Reading Challenge is:

READ a book → ENTER it on the MY SUMMER READING page → WRITE a review (see **Advice** below)

And then : READ a book → ENTER it on MY SUMMER READING → WRITE a review

And then : READ a book ... ad infinitum

Book tokens will be awarded for the best log books returned at the start of the Autumn Term.

Advice

- **You are expected to review at least 3 books.** A few well-written and thoughtful reviews rather than lots of brief or basic ones will give you a greater chance of winning. Entries will be judged on the effort you put into your log book. **The prize will not necessarily be awarded to the person who has read the most.**
- Push yourself to try new genres or authors. Explore Young Adult and Adult fiction to develop your reading.
- Review templates are provided to help you get started but you can use the blank pages if you prefer. You can also include any other reading-related material in your log. For example a website review, an author biography or even illustrations. This must be your own work.
- Remember to download and save this PDF to edit. Or print and fill in by hand.
- You can also read and review eBooks. If you are already at MTS, just log in to the library catalogue and search for eBooks. Or check out what's available through your public library.
- **Your log book must be returned to your English teacher by Monday 13th September 2021.**

WRITING BOOK REVIEWS

A book review is...

A piece of writing that tells you about a book so that you can decide whether you would like to read it.

A book review is not...

A piece of writing that retells the story. If you give away the plot you spoil the book for others.

Before you begin ask yourself these questions:

- Do I need to provide any background information? For example, the genre of the book or whether it is part of a series.
- What type of story was it? Was it funny, boring, exciting, sad? Think of as many adjectives as you can to describe the story.
- Who were the main characters?
- What were the main characters like? Were they old, young, sociable, irascible? Think of as many adjectives as you can to describe the characters.
- What did you like or enjoy about the story? For example, did it make you laugh and cheer you up, or did you enjoy being scared by it?
- What did you dislike or not enjoy about the story? For example, was it meant to be funny but didn't make you laugh.
- Was the book too long, or too short or just right?
- How did you feel when you had finished the book?
- On a scale of 1 to 5, how many points would you give the book?

I chose this book because I have also read Pig-Heart Boy by Malorie Blackman and enjoyed that. Noughts & Crosses is about two young people caught up in social expectations and racial discrimination, in a world where white people (Noughts) are seen to be inferior and are controlled by black Crosses.

Callum and Sephy are the main characters in this book and their relationship seems to be doomed from the start. This is because Callum is a Nought and Sephy is a Cross and according to society the two shouldn't mix. Each chapter of the book is written from either the perspective of Callum or Sephy which was really interesting.

What I thought

Noughts & Crosses was really thought provoking because of the ideas around race and racism. But it was the relationship between Callum and Sephy that really drove the story. Caught between the feelings they have for each other and the society they have been brought up in. I especially enjoyed reading about the Liberation Militia and how Callum gets caught up in helping them despite how he feels about Sephy. The ending was a real shock for me, but it has made me want to read the next books in the series. I would highly recommend Noughts & Crosses to anyone.






