Becoming *a Scholar*

We recognise that Scholars will differ in their interests and abilities. Some might excel in STEM and others in the Liberal Arts. Still others might be fortunate enough to achieve excellence across the board. Therefore, whilst general academic ability and strong performance in examinations are important considerations in our scholarship selection process, it is equally important that potential Scholars have intellectual interests that go beyond their school curriculum.

Our Scholarship process takes both of these into account. Candidates who have excelled in our entrance examinations will be invited to a Scholarship Day, during which they will participate in a range of activities that are designed to enable their problem-solving skills, curiosity and joy of learning to flourish. Throughout the day, candidates will be in small groups, which gives them the chance to shine and gives us a chance to get to know them.

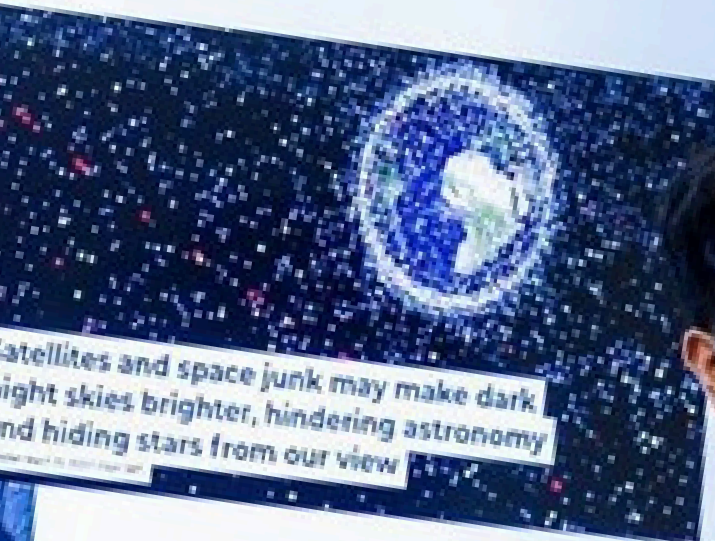
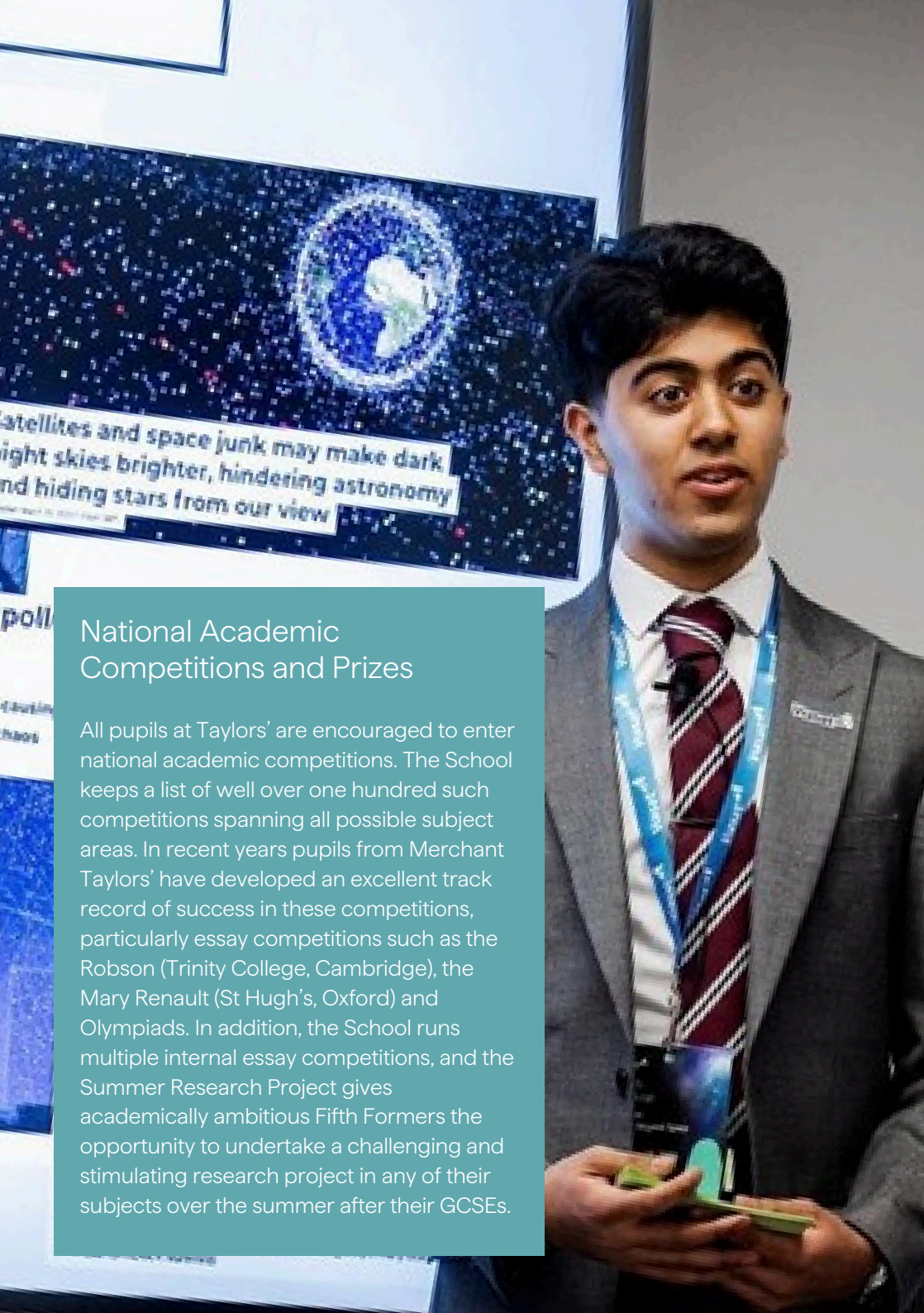
The Scholarship *Programme*

The Scholars' Lecture Program

The Scholars' Lecture Program Scholars in each year meet weekly, with each half-term having a different focus of a seminar led by a teacher on a topic that is not encountered in the regular syllabus. Topics this year have included Cryptography, Renaissance Drama, Fine Art appreciation, the representation of politics and leadership in the media, Data Science and sustainable product design and production.

Scholarship Projects

Each year, Scholars will work on a project, either individually or in groups. These might be projects designed and run by teachers at Merchant Taylors' or national competitions. Examples in recent years include designing a space station, submissions to the Earth Prize Competition, an investigation into antibiotics using the ecosystem of the Taylors' campus, and addressing the economic challenges facing the UK through participation in the FT's Young Economist of the Year competition.



National Academic Competitions and Prizes

All pupils at Taylors' are encouraged to enter national academic competitions. The School keeps a list of well over one hundred such competitions spanning all possible subject areas. In recent years pupils from Merchant Taylors' have developed an excellent track record of success in these competitions, particularly essay competitions such as the Robson (Trinity College, Cambridge), the Mary Renault (St Hugh's, Oxford) and Olympiads. In addition, the School runs multiple internal essay competitions, and the Summer Research Project gives academically ambitious Fifth Formers the opportunity to undertake a challenging and stimulating research project in any of their subjects over the summer after their GCSEs.



In the *Sixth Form*

In the Sixth Form, we expect all our pupils to consider themselves scholars. As such, every lesson should be approached with scholarly curiosity and our staff take great joy in extending their classes beyond the confines of the A Level specifications.

Nevertheless, there are also numerous additional ways for our top scholars to stand out from the field at Merchant Taylors' and the wider cohort with whom they will be competing for the most competitive university courses. In addition, all members of the Sixth Form participate in directed extension classes across a wide range of academic disciplines, both those that operate in parallel with taught subjects and those that open up new fields such as law. Pupils also have the benefit of weekly small group tutorials with an Academic Supervisor who facilitates and manages their development and wider reading. Our pupils leave the Sixth Form thoroughly prepared for further study, and it is a source of great pride at Merchant Taylors' that so many OMTs go on to excel at university.
